





Dear Reader,

Prepare for an interesting ride. The research reported here will take you new places, even if you've already been to Tanzania or Algiers, to Egypt or Palestine, to Milton's Paradise or the bottom of a beer mug.

As I drive across glacially-swept fields and river basins to visit the campuses of the 14 colleges of the Associated Colleges of the Midwest (ACM)—which are sprinkled across the prairie from Lake Michigan to the edge of the Rockies—I often think about how place matters. Each campus has a distinctive narrative, a story that gives particular human meaning and under-

standing to its setting. Why does place matter? Because place is not only location but also memory, and meaning.

The place I grew up was a small Midwestern prairie town. The yards were laid out like postage stamps, interrupted only by a stream or one of the lakes that dot Minnesota. Beyond that were fields that stretched as far as my bike or imagination could carry me.

When I got to college and began to do research for the first time, I discovered the imprint of that childhood place was still in my mind. It gave me a blueprint for thinking about ideas and the world I was discovering. That Midwestern mental map allowed ample space for laying out questions, sorting through possible approaches to answers, and organizing evidence that was often as jumbled as it was intriguing. There was even room to run out a distance and look over everything to see what I'd found. When I was lucky, I could see meaning—but many times I had to return to work in the fields of evidence or theory before finding understanding or a coherent narrative.

Place shapes research in important ways. Specific places stimulate questions that might not be asked elsewhere—or were nascent but still hidden. Place effects access to the theories relevant to one's question and the hypotheses that one might test, as well as the nature, quantity, and scope of evidence a researcher can gather. Sometimes the kind of analysis one can do—from the close, guided reading of a text to a test by an electron spectrometer—also depends on place. Place even shapes the presentation of findings, whether in a paper, a poster, a conversation with friends, or a journal.

In the research papers of this Journal, the authors proceed from a shared experience of studying at colleges located in the Midwest, to take you places that are robust with stories, insight and understanding. Thank you for taking the time to read what they've found. Oh, the places you'll go ...
